The Story of St. Dismas

St. Dismas, also known as the Good Thief, is the apocryphal name given to one of the two thieves (Matthew 27:38) who was crucified alongside Jesus, repented of his sins, and asked Jesus to remember him in his kingdom. According to the Gospel of Luke 23:39-43 the story of Dismas and Jesus is told as follows:

Now one of the criminals hanging there reviled Jesus, saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us." The other, however, rebuking him, said in reply, "Have you no fear of God, for you are subject to the same condemnation? And indeed, we have been condemned justly, for the sentence we received corresponds to our crimes, but this man has done nothing criminal." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He replied to him, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise.

The Way of the Cross with the Good Thief

The Scriptural Way of the Cross has 14 Stations that tell the story of Jesus as he made his final journey from his arrest to being laid in the tomb.

The Way of the Cross with the Good Thief reflections were developed by a man named Don as he did time in prison and it looks at the story from the view point of Dismas- the Good Thief. The name of "Dismas" for this person, unnamed in the canonical Gospel itself, appears first in the twelfth century in the Gospel of Nicodemus. We meet the "Good Thief" in Gospel of Luke 23:39-43:

Now one of the criminals hanging there reviled Jesus, saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us."

The other, however, rebuking him, said in reply, "Have you no fear of God, for you are subject to the same condemnation. And indeed, we have been condemned justly, for the sentence we received corresponds to our crimes, but this man has done nothing criminal." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

He replied to him, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

How to use the Way of the Cross at a Fellowship

A tradition at some of the Dismas Fellowships is to use a number of these Stations as part of the Good Friday gathering, although they could be used at anytime. For a 30 minute service you may want to pick 5-7 of the Stations.

At the beginning of the evening, as people arrive, ask for volunteers for the Way of the Cross reflection. The roles are: Narrator/ Dismas /1 person per station selected to be included in the evening who will offer a short reflection on the theme of a particular Station.

The narrator role is to guide people through the program so it should be a person familiar with the entire Way of the Cross story. The narrator usually reads the bible passage, the reflection question and prayer. The narrator also summarizes in a few words the Stations that are not part of the evening program so the group experiences the entire story.

The role of Dismas is best portrayed by a person that has done time. This individual will read the Dismas reflection.

Following the reading of the Dismas portion the narrator reads the reflection question which has a theme. The Narrator then invites the pre-selected individual to share their own thoughts on the theme.

After the sharing the narrator invites the group to say the Prayer for that Station and then as a Fellowship everyone joins in the singing of "Jesus remember me when you come into your kingdom" as a transition to the next Station.

Following the reading of the last Station the Dismas reader shares his/her own reflection and then the narrator can ask if any one else in the group would like to share a thought about the story they have just experienced.

Below is a list of each Station and their related theme.

Letter from St. Dismas

Dear Friends,

My name is Dismas - that is not my real name mind you but it is the one I now go by as it was given to me by my good friend Jesus. You see I am what was known as a bad seed by many. I had a rough childhood - my dad was a nasty man and he was hard on my mom and all of us kids. He liked his wine too much and no matter what any of us did it was never good enough.

I left our small town when I was only 15 years old and shortly after I hooked up with this older guy called Gestas - he was a real tough guy and together we made quite a pair.

We took no crap from anyone and pretty soon we had our territory marked out and any travelers coming by were ours for the taking. I remember this one couple that wandered into our neighborhood - they were from Nazareth - they seemed to be on the run and they had a baby with them. My partner wanted to rip them off but I could sense that they were different and I told Gestas to back off and let them proceed on their journey.

I first got to talk to Jesus face to face in a cell we briefly shared. You see my life of crime had caught up with me and my buddy Gestas, and we were sentenced to die by hanging on a cross. The Romans were brutal and they showed us no mercy. My time was up and I knew it and there was nowhere left to run. Seems I was not as good a thief as I thought I was.

Just before we were led out to be executed the Romans threw Jesus into our cell. It only took one look to know that he was different from the rest of us in that cold dungeon room. The story that follows is what happened to us on that last day of our lives.

It was a journey we took together on the way to the cross and it changed my life in an instant. I hope by the time you are finished hearing our story you too will know that no matter what you may have done in your life, my brother Jesus will welcome you with open arms into the Kingdom and there you will find peace.

Your Friend, Dismas Station 1: Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane Theme: Prayer



Matthew 26:36-41

Then Jesus came with them to a place called Gethsemane, and he said to his disciples, "Sit here while I go over there and pray." He took along Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, and began to feel sorrow and distress. Then he said to them, "My soul is sorrowful even to death. Remain here and keep watch with me." He advanced a little and fell face down in prayer, saying, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet, not as I will, but as you will.

Dismas Reflection:

As I sat in my cell with my partner Gestas, I began to regret all that I had done especially since in a day or so, Gestas and I would be put to death.

I began to feel sorrow and a sense of shame for what I've done. As I sat in this dark and damp cell lost in my thoughts, the guards

opened the cell door and threw a new prisoner into the darkness. I asked him for his name and he said "I am Jesus".

I had heard rumors about a man called Jesus. There was talk that he was working all of these wonders for the people, healing them and helping them. I asked, "Are you the same man?" He said he was. We then talked for hours and I felt remarkably at ease with him. He was like no other man I had ever met. I told him how regretful and afraid I was. He told me he too was afraid, and he shared with me how he had prayed to his Father – whom he said was God - in some garden just a few hours ago. I told him I was too ashamed and unworthy to ask God for anything, he told me not to worry, we'd do it together.

Reflection Question on Theme: Prayer

Jesus, you prayed to your Father, Can you help me to reach out to Him in prayer in my time of need?

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, give me the strength to endure my daily burden and courage to come to you in prayer and the wisdom to know and accept your will.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 2: Jesus, Betrayed by Judas, is Arrested Theme: Betrayal



Mark 14: 43-46

Then, while [Jesus] was still speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve, arrived, accompanied by a crowd with swords and clubs, who had come from the chief priests, the scribes, and the elders. His betrayer had arranged a signal with them, saying, "the man I shall kiss is the one; arrest him and lead him away securely." He came and immediately went over to him and said, "Rabbi." And he kissed him. At this they laid hands on him and arrested him.

Dismas Reflection:

As Jesus and I continued our talk, he told me how one of his own guys had turned him into the religious leaders. I have no idea why this Judas turned against his friend, but what amazed me is that Jesus wasn't even angry with him.

I've been snitched on before, I can tell you, all I remember was wanting revenge. Anger and hate have ruled most of my life. My so- called 'friends' and even my own family, who were supposed to be the ones I could trust the most, turned out to be those I could trust the least. I hated them for their betrayal.

Jesus was different, even while he talked about his betrayal by his own friend, he showed no hate or anger, only a sad look about him as he wondered about his friend.

Reflection Question on Betrayal

Jesus, I too know about betrayal. Is there hope for a heart twisted with anger and hatred?

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, let your love flow through my heart, let this love take away the hardness of my heart. Help me to learn to let go of my anger and hate that I too may learn to love and forgive.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 3: Jesus, Condemned by the Sanhedrin Theme: Judgement



Luke 22:66-71

At daybreak the council of the elders of the people, both the chief priests and teachers of the law, met together, and Jesus was led before them. "If you are the Christ," they said, "tell us." Jesus answered, "If I tell you, you will not believe me, and if I asked you, you would not answer. But from now on, the Son of Man will be seated at the right hand of the mighty God." They all asked, "Are you then the Son of God?" He replied, "You are right in saying I am." Then they said, "Why do we need any more testimony? We have heard it from his own lips."

Dismas Reflection:

My new friend Jesus and I were still talking when the temple guards came in. They took Jesus and told him the high priest wanted to talk to him. Before he left, he touched my arm reassuringly. When Jesus was gone, the darkness and gloom seemed to close in on me. I suddenly became anxious, pacing in my cell and I started to feel confused. I couldn't understand how much this Jesus had affected me.

I can't deny that the short time we had spent together were the best three hours of my life. I felt for the first time in my life free from fear and loneliness. Jesus did not see me as a thief, but as a person. I really appreciated that more than he could possibly ever know. I hoped they would bring him back to me.

Reflection Question on Judgement:

Jesus, I've been a loner all my life, always restless and confused. I have been judged and I have judged others harshly. Can you help me to accept others the way you have accepted me?

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, come into my life and let your light shine on the path you choose for me. Let me accept others the way your Son has accepted me.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 4: Jesus is denied by Peter Theme: Abandonment



Matthew 26: 69-75

[After twice denying Jesus in the courtyard of the building where Christ was being held captive, Peter was approached again and asked] "Surely you too are one of them; even your speech gives you away." At that [Peter] began to curse and to swear, "I do not know the man." And immediately a cock crowed. Then Peter remembered the word that Jesus had spoken: "Before the cock crows you will deny me three times." He went out and began to weep bitterly

Dismas Reflection:

It wasn't too long before Jesus came back to our cell. He looked a little roughed up. Before I could even ask if he was okay, he held up his hand as he made his way toward me by the cell window. He pointed out this tall guy next to a fire. He told me this guy's name was Peter and that he was his good and trusted friend. Just as Jesus finished, we heard this Peter yell out that he did not know Jesus. As I looked out the window I saw Peter hurrying away from a servant girl. As I looked back at Jesus, I couldn't help feeling for the guy. It's a shame, but it happens all the time. Just when you think you can trust someone you believe to be a friend, they shut the door and lock you out. What really amazed me however, was the way Jesus was dealing with it all.

He got very quiet and with his eyes closed he asked God, who he again called Father, to forgive Peter, his friend, even though this Peter had just denied knowing him.

Reflection Question on Abandonment:


Jesus, how can I or anyone bear the grief and loneliness abandonment brings. Can you help me to understand and forgive?

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, grant that I might rise above my own grief and loneliness, so that I might learn to forgive others who have hurt me or abandoned me and help me to stick with others in their time of need.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 5: Jesus is judged by Pilate Theme: Falsely Accused



Mark 15: 1-5, 15

The chief priests with the elders and the scribes, held a council. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate. Pilate questioned him, "Are you the king of the Jews?" He said to him in reply, "You say so." The chief priests accused him of many things. Again Pilate questioned him, "Have you no answer? See how many things they accuse you of." Jesus gave him no further answer, so that Pilate was amazed.... Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barrabas... [and] handed [Jesus] over to be crucified.

Dismas Reflection:

When morning came, so did the temple guards. As they were putting chains on Jesus, I could hear men talking outside our cell window.

For a quick moment, I thought his friend had come back with others to break him out. As I drew closer to the window, I realized that it was the religious leaders. They were talking to a small group of men and they were conspiring to frame Jesus and to get him crucified. It was all too much.

Even I, a common thief, know that you don't have to lie if a person is guilty. What I was hearing was too much to bear. Not only because of my new friend Jesus, but what the religious leaders were doing to him reminded me of my own past. I've betrayed innocent blood to get what I wanted. When I faced the truth about what I had done, I was filled with shame and anguish.

Reflection Question on being falsely accused:

Jesus, can there be any forgiveness for our unjust actions and false accusations against others?

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, grant me the strength to be honest in my dealings with others and to never bend the truth against another for my own benefit. Help me to forgive those who have falsely accused me in the past and free me from all hatred and resentment towards them.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 6: Jesus is Scourged and Crowned with Thorns Theme: Pain and Sorrow



Mark 15: 16-20

The soldiers led Jesus away into the palace and called together the whole company of soldiers. They put a purple robe on him, then twisted together a crown of thorns and set it on him. And they began to call out to him, "Hail, King of the Jews!" Again and again they struck him on the head with a staff and spit on him. Falling on their knees, they paid homage to him. And when they had mocked him, they took off the purple robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him.

Dismas Reflection:

The guards told us they had to tend to some "royal business", but they'd be back for Gestas and me. I wondered what happened to Jesus. Those religious leaders and their treacherous crowd seemed eager to get Jesus a death sentence. Why they would want to kill a man like Jesus is beyond me. I think they were jealous of Jesus and threatened by his new ways of doing things. Jesus seemed like a very peaceful man. Knowing people is something I'm good at and there was no violence or deceit in Jesus.

Well it didn't matter anymore; the guards came with the slabs of wood. They tied our arms to the wood and led us into the court yard. As I stepped out I could not believe what I was seeing. They had whipped my friend Jesus bloody and placed a branch of thorns on his head like a crown. My heart sank when he looked over at me. I don't understand how an innocent man could have come to this.

Reflection Question:


Jesus, why is it that we hurt each other, that we lie and deceive others? Why is there so much pain and sorrow in the world?

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, light my path that I do not stumble. Let me be free of hated and prejudice in my life. Keep me strong in truth and deed so others might see your love in me.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 7: Jesus bears his cross Theme: Hardship



John 19:15-17

But they shouted, "Take him away! Take him away! Crucify him!" "Shall I crucify your king?" Pilate asked. "We have no king but Caesar," the chief priests answered. Finally Pilate handed him over to them to be crucified.

So the soldiers took charge of Jesus. Carrying his own cross, he went out to the place of the Skull.

Dismas Reflection:

My buddy Gestas thought the sight of Jesus' bloody body from the whipping was pretty funny. He started to call him all sorts of names. I could not believe it when they made Jesus pick up his entire cross and carry it. We only carried the top portion but the guards really have it in for Jesus. Their cruelty knew no end.

God, if I only had one more chance, I'd do things differently. As I looked at Jesus all ripped and bloody, I felt shame for some reason. Maybe because I knew he was an innocent man. It was like he was carrying the sins of all of us on his back with that heavy cross.

Reflection Question:

Jesus, I've experienced hardship all of my life and I have caused it as well. Tell me am I bound by it, or is there a better way?

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, help me to see and understand the pain in my life, and give me the strength to make sure that my actions do not cause hardship and hurt to others.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 8: Jesus is helped by Simon to carry the Cross Theme: Accepting help & offering help



Mark 15: 21

Then they led Jesus out to crucify him. They pressed into service a passer-by, Simon, to [help Jesus] carry his cross.

Dismas Reflection:

I knew that cross would be too heavy for Jesus especially after the beating he took at the hands of the guards.

The soldiers and the people kept mocking him and laughing at him. Why did they hate this guy so much? As we were walking through the market Jesus kept falling to his knees. Finally they got this guy to help him; he looked strong enough. Now I am an "old-school guy" but Jesus taught me another thing by accepting help from this guy - asking for and accepting help is not something I am very good at- I thought it was a sign of weakness- you see I am too proud to ask for a help even though I know I need it.

Jesus simply thanked the stranger and got back on his feet and continued the journey.

Reflection Question:

Jesus, Can you assist me to be strong enough to ask for help when I need it and to offer it to others when I am able.

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, grant me a willing spirit that is not too proud to ask for help when I need it and to offer help to others when I am able.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 9: Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem Theme: Kindness & Compassion



Luke 23: 27

A large number of people followed him, including women who mourned and wailed for him.

Dismas Reflection:

We were halfway along the route to our execution place. There was a small band of women who were following Jesus. One woman really pushed her luck when she ran up to Jesus and she wiped his face with a cloth. She had courage, to say the least, but the Romans pushed her aside and we continued our last stretch of road.

As I have said many times in telling you this story, something just doesn't seem right though. People lined the road calling Jesus, Rabbi or even Master. They had a lot of names for Him, but the one that stood out was Messiah. I had heard stories about a Messiah, the chosen one of God. Could Jesus really be the one who was chosen by God?

Was this why he kept calling God his Father?

Reflection Question:


Jesus, in my life, I've often failed to stop and help another in need. With your love in my heart do you think I could show kindness to another the way that woman did to you?

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, grant me a generous and loving heart, to do your will and to show kindness to those who need it, especially to those whom in the past I have judged as unworthy of my kindness and compassion.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 10: Jesus is crucified Theme: Forgiveness



Luke 23: 33-34

When they came to the place called the Skull, they crucified him and the criminals there, one on his right, the other on his left. [Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do."]

Dismas Reflection:

The pain of being crucified was unbelievable. The Roman soldiers knew how to make a person suffer. With Jesus they took extra pleasure in driving those nails through his hands and his feet.

Then, after it was all finished and they slammed the cross into place. Jesus once again surprised me - instead of cursing his tormentors, instead of vowing revenge on all who had betrayed him, Jesus looked up towards the heavens and said to God, "Father, please forgive them all, for they don't know what they are doing."

It got me thinking - perhaps if I was to ask for forgiveness from Jesus for all the wrong I had done, for the pain I had caused, if I asked, then maybe, he would see to it that God would forgive me.

I asked ... and Jesus told me that my sins were forgiven. He then told me to offer that same forgiveness to all who had hurt me. I did that - in my heart I forgave my family for all they had done to me, and my friends who had forgotten me. It's hard to describe, but at that moment I felt a peace come over me - even though I was in great physical pain, it felt like a tremendous weight had been lifted from my shoulders.


Reflection Question:

Jesus, is forgiveness for my sins really possible? How can I forgive so much that was done to me?

With St. Dismas we pray:

God, grant me a merciful heart to forgive those who offended me, and grant me forgiveness for the wrongs I have committed.

Station 11: Jesus Promises His Kingdom to the Good Thief Theme: Hope



Luke 23: 39-43

Now one of the criminals hanging there shouted at Jesus, saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us." The other, however, rebuking him, said in reply, "Have you no fear of God, for you are subject to the same condemnation? And indeed, we have been condemned justly, for the sentence we received corresponds to our crimes, but this man has done nothing criminal." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He replied to him, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

Dismas Reflection:

We had been up there for a few hours now. As I looked down, I could see those who followed Jesus. I even saw the religious leaders there; they were still mocking him, even Gestas. I asked Gestas why he didn't fear God. I told him we deserved our punishment, but that Jesus was an innocent man.

At that very moment I believed that Jesus was the Son of God. I can't explain it, but I believed it. I turned to look at Him and asked, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your Kingdom". He looked over at me with eyes wide open and a love I cannot explain and said "My friend, today you will be with me in paradise."

In the middle of all this suffering I had hope for the first time- I believed that paradise awaited me just as Jesus had promised.

Reflection Question:

Jesus, I've always been disappointed in deals 'too good to be true'. Is believing in you enough to be saved?

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, grant me a heart and mind working as one, believing in your promise of everlasting life which is realized through faith in your son Jesus.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 12: Jesus speaks to his Mother and the disciple Theme: Love



John 19:25-27

Near the cross of Jesus stood his mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother there, and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to his mother, "Dear woman, here is your son," and to the disciple, "Here is your mother." From that time on, this disciple took her into his home.

Dismas Reflection:

It seemed like forever hanging there waiting to die. I could feel myself getting weaker moment by moment, even the pain was fading away. The sky was getting darker, even though it was only midday.

I believed God might be angry and rightfully so. I had heard Jesus talking. It was to his mother. I saw how much this hurt her. To see her son put to death, knowing his innocence.

He also talked to his followers. I'm not sure, but I think he asked someone to care for his mother. Even close to death, Jesus thought of his mother's well being; how wonderful, how powerful his love for her was.

Reflection Question:

Jesus, who are our brothers and sisters? Are we truly all part of God's family?

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, assist me to embrace all of my brothers and sisters and grant me a tender touch for those who need a helping hand and a caring heart. May I be a sign of your peace and love to all.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 13: Jesus Dies on the Cross Theme: Salvation



Luke 23: 44-46

It was now about noon and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon because of an eclipse of the sun. Then the veil of the temple was torn down the middle. Jesus cried out in a loud voice, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit"; and when he had said this he breathed his last.

A Moment of Silence

Dismas Reflection:

The darkness was complete. I could only see the shadow of Jesus. He cried out, then his head fell forward. Right after that the earth began shaking and the temple veil was torn in two. The guard in front of Jesus' cross fell to his knees saying "Jesus truly was the Son of God."

In a few moments, I too passed into death. But I had no fear. Jesus promised that I would be in paradise with him and I believed him. For the first time in my life, I felt a peace I have never had before. I knew I would see him again. I knew that Jesus died for me, for everyone – He died, so we could live.

I find it hard to put into words, but it is as though this man called Jesus went through all of this so I would know that my life was of value, that I mattered. It is as though he died this horrible death so that I would realize that suffering is a part of life, and that, even in suffering, we can know the peace of God.

That was the day Jesus welcomed me into paradise.

Reflection Question:


Jesus, I believe in You, but I'm constantly battling doubts and fear. Is there any hope for me? Will I be saved?

With St. Dismas we pray:

Dear God, grant that I may always trust in you and that when my time on earth is ended I know you will welcome my spirit home to be with you, with your son Jesus and all the faithful departed including St. Dismas.

Together we sing: (3x)

Station 14: Jesus is placed in a tomb Theme: I am thankful to God for.....



Matthew 27: 57-61:

As evening approached, there came a rich man from Arimathea, named Joseph, who had himself become a disciple of Jesus. Going to Pilate, he asked for Jesus' body, and Pilate ordered that it be given to him. Joseph took the body, wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, and placed it in his own new tomb that he had cut out of the rock. He rolled a big stone in front of the entrance to the tomb and went away. Mary Magdalene and the other Mary were sitting there opposite the tomb.

Closing Reflection:

The last station brings the story of our Lord's passion to a close but this is not the end. From his birth until his death on Golgotha, Jesus remained faithful to God. In three days' time Jesus will rise from the dead on Easter Sunday delivering us the promise of life everlasting. Because of God's grace we are given a chance at salvation just as the good thief Saint Dismas was. This grace cannot be bought, worked for nor bribed. This grace comes to us in the person of Jesus Christ and in the knowledge that we are loved by our God and that there is eternal life. Jesus didn't come to us just to preach, but also to show us how much God loves us. He showed us the depth of this love when they crucified Jesus. Jesus himself said, "No greater love has a person than to give his life for another". Jesus talked the talk, but even more, he walked it.

Has God given you good health, a good meal, a good job?Then thank God.Has God blessed you with family and friends who care?Praise God.Has God revealed the solution to a difficult problem?Give God his due.Has God saved you from sin and eternal death?Then give God glory and follow Him daily.

Reflection Question:

I am thankful to God for.....

With St. Dismas we pray:
